




WILL-TV features Miles Davis for Black History Month

American Masters presents the premiere of award-winning filmmaker Stanley Nelson's deep dive into the world of a beloved musical giant. American Masters—Miles Davis: Birth of the Cool, which earned a Grammy nomination in the "Best Music Film" category, premieres at 8 pm Tuesday, February 25. It is also available with your WILL Passport on the PBS Video app in honor of Black History

A visionary known for his restless aesthetic, Davis is widely regarded as one of the most innovative, influential, and respected figures in music. With full access to the Miles Davis Estate, the film features never-before-seen footage, including studio outtakes from his recording sessions, rare photos, and new interviews. Quincy Jones, Carlos Santana, Clive Davis, Wayne Shorter, Davis' son Erin Davis and nephew Vince Wilburn, bassist and Davis collaborator Marcus Miller, and Ron Carter are just a few of the luminaries weighing in on the life and career of the cultural icon.

American Masters—Miles Davis: Birth of the Cool takes a hard look at the mythology that surrounds the legend. "The story of Miles Davis—who he was as a man and artist—has often been told as the tale of a drug-addled genius," said Nelson. "You rarely see a portrait






of a man that worked hard at honing his craft, a man who deeply studied all forms of music, from Baroque to classical Indian. An elegant man who could render ballads with such tenderness yet hold rage in his heart from the racism he faced throughout his life. He could be romantic and pursue women relentlessly, yet treat them with cruelty upon winning them over. He could be extremely generous, yet rescind that generosity on a whim."

The documentary delves into the six-decade career of the musical genius: from his days as a Juilliard student to the development of his signature sound on recordings with his famous quintet, from his collaborations with Gil Evans to his shifts to new musical paradigms in the 70s and 80s. As the film tracks Davis' boundary-breaking musical triumphs, the meanderings of his complicated personal life are told with intimate reflections from those closest to him. New interviews with friends, fellow musicians, collaborators, and scholars create a full portrait of the complex man. The film, which premiered at the Sundance Film Festival and had a successful limited theatrical run, tells the story of a truly singular talent and unpacks the man behind the horn.



Can science and religion coexist?



Produced by Chicago's 137 Films, We Believe in Dinosaurs tells the story of the building of an enormous, \$120 million Noah's Ark at the Creation Museum in rural Williamstown. Kentucky, an exhibit designed to prove the Bible is scientifically and historically accurate. Along with detailing the Ark's preparation, the film follows several Kentuckians: Doug Henderson and his team of artists and designers who create lifelike animals: Dan Phelps, a geologist who blows the whistle on the Ark's hiring practices; David MacMillan, a former creationist and lifetime museum member who blogs critically about beliefs he once held; and atheist activist Jim Helton, co-founder of Tri-State Freethinkers, who leads a protest rally outside the Ark on opening day. As the citizens of Williamstown wait for the economic boon promised by the Ark's founders, creationists spread the gospel of a 6,000 year-old Earth. Airing at 9 pm Monday, February 17, We Believe in Dinosaurs explores the roots of our beliefs.

The politics of crisis in an American city



In July 1995, a heat wave overtook Chicago: high humidity and a layer of heat-retaining pollution drove the heat index up to more than 126 degrees. City roads buckled, rails warped, electric grids failed, thousands became ill and people began to die—by the hundreds. Cooked tells the story of this heat wave, the most traumatic in US history, in which 739

Chicago citizens died in a single week, most of them poor, elderly, and African American. Balancing serious and somber with her respectful, albeit ironic and and signature quirky style, Peabody award-winning filmmaker Judith Helfand explores this drama that, when peeled away, reveals the less newsworthy but long-term crisis of pernicious poverty, economic, and social isolation and racism. Produced by Kartemquin Films in Chicago, , Cooked is a story about life, death, and the politics of crisis in an American city. See the film at 9 pm Monday, February 10 on WILL-TV.



A mother's fight for truth and justice

Always in Season explores the lingering impact of more than a century of lynching African Americans and connects this form of historic racial terrorism to racial violence today. The film centers on the case of Lennon Lacy, an African American teen who was found hanging from a swing set in Bladenboro, North Carolina, on August 29, 2014. Despite inconsistencies in the case, local officials quickly ruled Lennon's death a suicide, but his mother, Claudia, believes Lennon was lynched. Claudia moves from paralyzing grief to leading the fight for justice for her son. The film premieres at 9 pm Monday, February 24.

New podcast airs Sundays on WILL-AM 580

At 5 pm Sundays in February, White Lies tells the story of one of the most significant unsolved murders of the Civil Rights era, and dispels the myths and mistruths that have grown up around the story over the past five decades. In 1965. Rev. James Reeb



was murdered in Selma, Alabama. Three men were tried and acquitted, but no one was ever held to account. 50 years later, two journalists from Alabama return to the city where it happened, expose the lies that kept the murder from being solved, and uncover a story about guilt and memory that says as much about America today as it does about the past. Hosted by Morning Edition's Noel King and reported by Alabama journalists Andrew Beck Grace and Chip Brantley, this seven-episode series brings the stories from the groundbreaking investigative podcast to the radio audience.

What secrets do the Earth's poles hold?



NOVA presents an epic adventure through time at the Polar Extremes of our planet at 7 pm Wednesday, February 5. Following a trail of strange fossils found in all the wrong places beech trees in Antarctica, hippo-like mammals in the Arctic—paleontologist Kirk Johnson uncovers the bizarre history of the poles, from miles-high ice sheets to warm polar forests

teeming with life. What caused such dramatic changes at the ends of the Earth? And what controls the dial on Earth's thermostat? Today, the Arctic is warming faster than anywhere else in the world, and Antarctica has locked in its ice enough water to raise sea level by a terrifying 200 feet. The way that the poles respond to a warming climate is one of the greatest wildcards in predicting our climate future. Johnson uses Earth's history, written in stone, as a cipher to decode what is going on at our polar extremes today, and what the future may hold.



June 22, 1938. Though the Great Depression rages and war looms, the eyes of the world are on Yankee Stadium in New York where, beneath threatening skies, German Max Schmeling and American Joe Louis are squaring off for the heavyweight championship of the world. One commentator would call later call it "two minutes and four seconds of murder."

The pressure on each fighter is enormous. Joe Louis is not only fighting for the honor of the country, he is quite literally holding the hopes of all of black America in his fists. For Max

Schmeling, the fight will be a demonstration of Hitler's racial theories, and should the German lose, many fear for what could happen to him. Theirs was a rivalry that would draw in two nations inching closer to war, and take the measure of two men who had been fighting all their lives. American Experience's The Fight explores the famous 1938 heavyweight bout and finds two men who, in the shadow of war, became reluctant symbols of equality and supremacy, democracy and fascism. The film airs at 8 pm Tuesday, February 11.

the demonstrators on the bridge in Selma on Bloody Sunday to the March on Washington, both old and new "Freedom Songs" would become the backbone of the nonviolent civil disobedience movement lead by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. The power of this music would resonate through the movement and be the glue that held it together.

The show Oh Freedom!

features 11 of the pivotal songs that inspired and sustained this landmark movement. Intermixed with the music, Vallillo presents first-hand accounts of the historic struggle and discusses the impact of music to this most important social cause.
