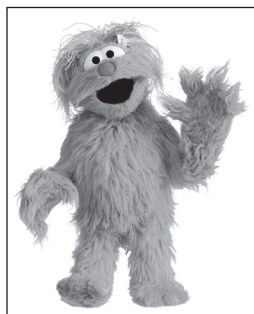

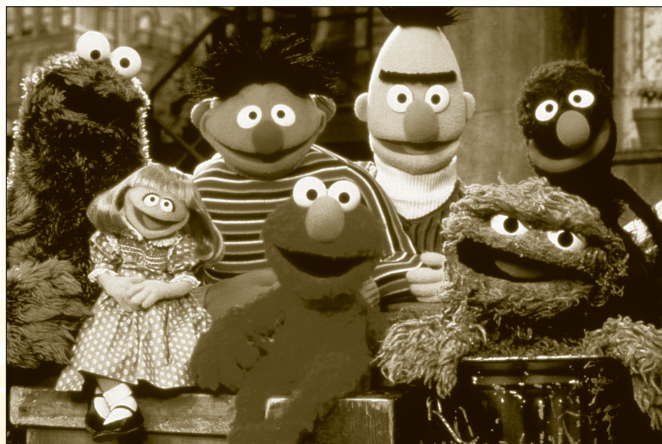

stunned. *The Susan?* It seemed impossible that such a beautiful, talented, and famous person from our favorite show would actually come to our area. In our finest 80s clothes, we stood mesmerized as Susan entertained a whole crowd of kids. It was the first time we'd seen a celebrity, and Susan was *our* celebrity. Afterwards, she posed for a picture with us. I've interviewed a lot of famous people since then as part of my job, but every time I look at this picture, I still think, wow, that was *the* Susan from **Sesame Street**."

SESAME STREET THROUGH THE DECADES

Sesame Street founders Joan Ganz Cooney and Lloyd Morrisett had a simple but revolutionary idea: Television could help prepare children for school. They tapped educational advisors, researchers, television producers, artists, and other visionaries to create the longest-running children's show in American television history. The first episode aired in 1969 and was an instant hit with children and parents alike.

Throughout its 50 years, **Sesame Street** has understood that children need more than just reading, writing, and arithmetic to succeed in life. In 1983 when Will Lee, aka Mr. Hooper, passed away, Sesame Workshop's experts and writers carefully planned how to tell young children about death. Whoopi Goldberg and Elmo compared and celebrated the colors and textures of their skin and fur in 1990—one of many segments that

promote diversity, empathy, cultural competence, and mutual respect and understanding. Muppet Karli shed light on the foster care system, addiction, and different types of families, while Muppet Julia reduced the stigma of autism.

But while tackling these difficult topics, **Sesame Street** has continuously brought joy to children and their families. It created memorable hit songs like "Rubber Ducky," "C is for Cookie," and Big Bird's "ABC-DEF-GHI" with the most remarkable word he's ever seen! Spoofs like "Upside Downton Abbey," "The Hungry Games," and "The Add'ems Family" bring the funny to parents while still teaching preschoolers. And favorite characters have become best friends to children all over the world, creating an everlasting legacy.

Happy 50th anniversary, **Sesame Street**! Gold looks good on you.

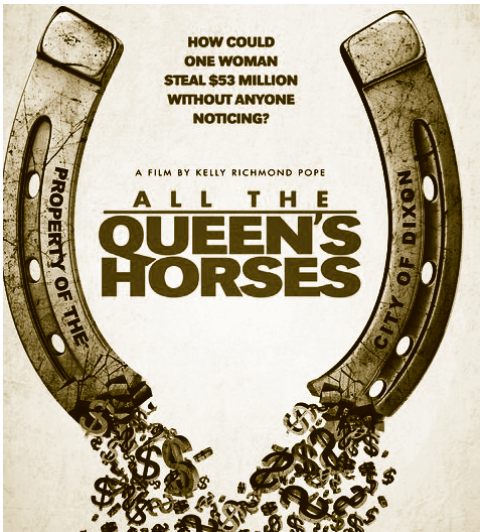




“How can we have justice without redemption?”

Shot over four years in maximum and medium security prisons in New York State, the film takes viewers on a stark and intimate journey into one of the most pressing issues of our time—our failure to provide meaningful rehabilitation for the over two million Americans living behind bars. **College Behind Bars** airs at 8 pm Monday and Tuesday, November 25-26.

Reel Midwest returns

As city comptroller of Dixon, IL, Rita Crundwell stole \$53 million of public funds across 20 years—making her the perpetrator of the largest case of municipal fraud in American history. She used the funds to build one of the nation's leading quarter horse breeding empires, all while forcing staff cuts, police budget slashing, and neglect of public infrastructure.

All The Queen's Horses is a documentary that investigates Crundwell’s crime, her lavish lifestyle, and the small town she left in her wake. The film airs at 8 pm Thursday, November 7 as a special presentation of the Illinois Public Media documentary series **Reel Midwest**.

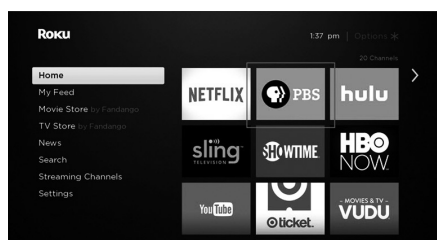

Viewing PBS Programs and Passport Content on your Roku Player

The PBS App is available on many different devices and is the way you can access your Passport member benefit. Currently, the most popular device that is used to access PBS content is a Roku Player. A Roku Player is a digital media player that allows you to stream video, music, and entertainment content. Roku comes in many different forms, from set-top boxes to TV sets with the service built into them. It can be found at most big box stores or online.



Once you have a Roku Player, you'll need to download the PBS App and activate the device. The activation steps are similar regardless of whether or not you have the Passport member benefit. Christine Herman presents on Carter fellowship with former president and first lady

In 2018, WILL Newsroom reporter Christine Herman was chosen as a Rosalynn Carter Fellow for Mental Health Journalism. Since then, Herman has been reporting on how barriers to mental health care in Illinois affect individuals, families and entire communities. Her stories have aired on NPR stations across the Midwest through Side Effects Public Media, and have aired nationally through a partnership between WILL, NPR, and Kaiser Health News.

Because of her success in these efforts, Herman was chosen from the 2018-19 cohort of Carter Fellows to present on her reporting to former President Jimmy Carter and former First Lady Rosalyn Carter in September. At this special meeting at The Carter Center in Atlanta, Georgia, Herman spoke to the Carters and the center's 200-member Board of Councilors.

"So many people living with mental illness aren't able to access the right care at the right time," Herman said. "Many people struggle in silence due to the stigma that persists. I'm thankful for the support from the Carter Center and WILL to shine a light on these issues."

These are just some of the stories Herman has produced since receiving the fellowship:

- "Out Of Options, Parents Of Children With Mental Illness Trade Custody For Treatment" shares the heartbreaking decision parents are making in order to ensure their children get adequate mental healthcare.
- "Why A Father Worries His Son's Mental Illness Could Get Him Deported" showcases how being undocumented prevents one father from getting the mental health support his son desperately needs.
- "Most Inmates With Mental Illness Still Wait For Decent Care" looks at the shortage of mental health treatment in Illinois prisons, which causes thousands of incarcerated people with mental illness to suffer as they await adequate care.

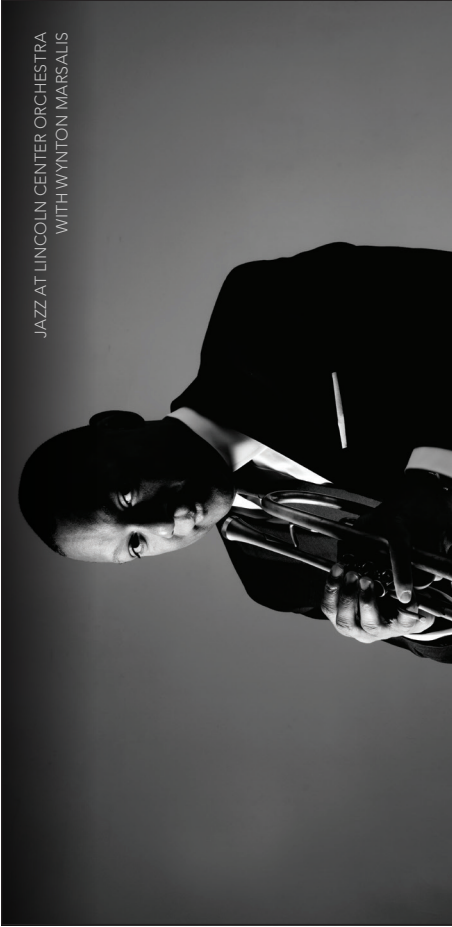
