

Itinerary

Day 1 Saturday: Central Illinois-Chicago-Flight

Erin Lippitz of WILL welcomes you aboard our private motor coach to Chicago where we board our overnight non-stop flight to London.

Day 2 Sunday: Arrival-Heathrow-Windsor-London

Welcome to England! We arrive in London's Heathrow airport this morning and meet our favorite tour manager, Victor Seedman. He takes us to nearby Windsor Castle for a guided tour of the State Apartments. While there, you may notice a French flag on the 17th-century French writing table that will connect us to our visit on day 8 to Blenheim Palace. We have a bit of free time for lunch and exploring the palace more. Then on to our London hotel located minutes from three rails stations: Euston, King's Cross and St. Pancras.

Day 3 Monday: London

After a leisurely start we head to the British Museum for a private guided tour of its Egyptian Sculpture Gallery before it opens to the public.

The rest of the morning and afternoon is free for independent exploration. We will have suggestions about what to see and do.

Day 4 Tuesday: London

This morning we head next door to the British Library for a tour of the treasures there such as the Magna Carta and Shakespeare's Sonnets. This afternoon is free and we will provide suggestions-perhaps the Garden Museum, Victoria & Albert Museum or Harrods, the world's most famous department store with its many Food Halls.

We will choose a play and include admission to the theatre with transportation to and fro. The performance will be decided on once summer options become available. (B)

Day 5 Wednesday: London-Bath

Today we head west from London to Bath in the county of Somerset, a city that has been welcoming visitors for two millennia. We stay at no. 6-11 Queen Square in the Francis Hotel, made up of six Grade I listed Georgian houses like the rest of this historic square. A group dinner is included tonight. (B, D)

Day 6 Thursday: Bath

Designated by UNESCO as a World Heritage Site, Bath presents some of the finest architectural sights in Europe, such as the Royal Crescent, the Circus and Pulteney Bridge. Expanding our awareness of

Your Tour Manager

Victor Seedman has led the last eight WILL tours in Europe. He started leading tours in the 1980's and has continued to do so while being the Head of Travel, Tourism & Hospitality for the London campus of the University of Gloucestershire. the Romano-British fusion of Celtic and Roman cultures in Britannia, we feature a guided tour of the complex of Roman Baths centered on a natural spring of hot water.

This afternoon enjoy included admission and free time to the Fashion Museum, Assembly Rooms and Victoria Art Gallery. Or explore The Jane Austen Centre (entry fee not included) until time for a traditional Afternoon Tea at The Pump Room with music included. (B, T)

Day 7 Friday: Bath-Witney-Oxford

We drive northeast to Oxfordshire. Our first stop is a visit to Cogges Manor Farm, a Downton Abbey film location. Cogges Manor Farm, a National Trust property, pretends to be a Downton farmhouse in the series, and is where little Marigold, Lady Edith's daughter, was raised by a Downton farm family. Farmed since before the Domesday Book, Cogges Manor dates to the 13th century.

Continuing to the city of Oxford, we experience a guided tour of the famous Bodleian library, one of the oldest in Europe. See Duke Humfrey's medieval library; this younger brother of King Henry V gave the university his priceless collection of more than 281 manuscripts.

On return to the hotel adjacent to the Ashmolean Museum, how about a drink at Morse Bar? You may rec-

ognize it as the watering hole of Colin Dexter's world-famous detective, Inspector Morse. (B)

Day 8 Saturday: Oxford-Woodstock-Bladon-Oxford

We visit Woodstock and the spectacular Blenheim Palace built by John Churchill, the first Duke of Marlborough, to commemorate his 1704 victory at the Bavarian town of the same name. A grateful England awarded the land to build the only non-royal dwelling to be called a palace. Included in the rambling plan was a throne for the Duke where he would lord over a looted 30-ton bust of the defeated French King Louis XIV. But the Duke died before that detail was complete. Over the centuries, the family's limited funds saw the palace nearly fall into ruins. However the ninth duke's marriage to the American railroad heiress Consuelo Vanderbilt provided funds for restoration and she got to become a Duchess in return.

In case you saw the permanent exhibition about Winston Churchill mentioning his premature birth at Blenheim in the ladies cloakroom, we will complete his journey with a visit to his gravesite at nearby Bladon. Then we have some free time; the Ashmolean Museum (the first university museum dating from 1677) or

Physical Requirements

the Pitts River Museum (artifacts are arranged by type into a 'democracy of things', rather than by time or region) are worth a visit.



The PBS Secrets Of series includes episodes on Westminster Abbey, Tower of London and Selfridges. We don't have scheduled trips to these locations but the group will have free time while in London and may choose to visit. All three episodes are available to stream on pbs.org

Persuasion by Jane Austen — A touching and enchanting novel about a second chance in love set in early nineteenth-century Bath. Bath is an incredibly romantic city and Jane Austen's novels are the perfect romantic read.

The Pickwick Papers by Charles Dickens — Dickens' first novel working the serious subject of the justice system into a comic novel and vividly brings to life Georgian Bath society.

Brideshead Revisited by Evelyn Waugh — Captures the dream of Oxford and full of nostalgia for the golden pre-war era. Holds the reputation of being the definitive depiction of undergraduate life. An Instance of the Fingerpost by lain Pears — Set in the immediate post-Restoration period the novel is narrated by four different and unreliable narrators, each with a different perspective of events.

MASTERPIECE Churchill's Secret — Available by streaming on WILL-TV Passport. Already a Friend of WILL but don't have Passport? Give WILL a ring, and we'll walk you through the activation process.

Colin Dexter, "Morse's Greatest Mystery and Other Stories", 1993. — Short story versions of Inspector Morse mysteries by the wonderful Colin Dexter. Available wherever you find your favorite books; the Morse Bar at the Randolph Hotel was a favorite film location for the Inspector Morse and Inspector Lewis series.

MASTERPIECE Northanger Abbey — one of two novels by Jane Austen to feature holidays in Bath. Available by streaming on WILL-TV Passport. Or read the novel (the first of Austen's novels to be published), available anywhere fine books are sold.

MASTERPIECE VICTORIA — this series is available for viewing in its entirety on WILL-TV Passport. Windsor Castle exteriors are featured in Series One. A Farewell Dinner is included tonight. (B, D)

Day 9 Sunday: Oxford-Heathrow-Flight-Chicago-Central Illinois

Victor accompanies us to Heathrow Airport for our farewell before boarding our non-stop flight back to Chicago. On arrival you are taken by private transfer back to central Illinois with wonderful memories of the rich history and charm of England. (B)

1 Our hotel, the Pullman London St. Pancras, is half way between two famous train stations, Euston & St. Pancras, 500 yards to each. It is adjacent to the British Library where we will see the Magna Carta and Shakespeare's sonnets.







The Francis Hotel comprises seven terraced townhouses, among the first built by the famous Georgian architect, John Wood the Elder, in 1736. It is now Grade 1 listed by English Heritage. Notable residents of the Queen Square townhouses include Jane Austen and William Gainsborough.





3 The Randolph Hotel is in the city center across the street from the Ashmolean Museum. The hotel bar's name recalls one its best known guests, John Thaw, who portrayed Inspector Morse on Mystery!
