During his eight-decade career, Bob Hope was the only performer to achieve top-rated success in every form of mass entertainment: vaudeville, Broadway, movies, radio, television, popular song and personal appearances, including hosting the Academy Awards a record 19 times and his annual USO Christmas military tours. Written, directed and produced by John Scheinfeld (The U.S. vs. John Lennon, Chasing Trane: The John Coltrane Documentary), American Masters: This is Bob Hope... presents a candid look at a remarkable life with unprecedented access to Hope's personal archives, including writings voiced by Billy Crystal and clips from Hope's body of work to reveal a gifted and very human individual who recognized the power of fame, embraced its responsibilities and handled celebrity with extraordinary wit and grace.

Airing at 7:30 pm Friday, December 1, the documentary also features new interviews with Woody Allen, Dick Cavett, Margaret Cho, daughter Linda Hope, Kermit the Frog, film critic/historian Leonard Maltin, Conan O'Brien, Tom Selleck, Brooke Shields, Connie Stevens, and biographer Richard Zoglin (*Hope: Entertainer of the Century*). The unabridged director's cut features over 35 minutes of additional footage, including Hope's 1930s comedy shorts and more about his radio and TV career, USO tours, and charity work.

In 1837, a diminutive, neglected teenager was crowned Queen Victoria; navigated the scandal, corruption, and political intrigues of the Court; and soon rose to become the most powerful woman in the world. Season two of *Victoria* finds the young queen wanting it all—romance, power, an heir, and personal freedom.

While adapting to motherhood after the birth of her first child—a daughter, to the disappointment of many—the disaster of the Anglo-Afghan War unfolds abroad and the catastrophic Irish potato famine begins to wreak havoc. In other foreign affairs, a royal state visit to France is in the offing.

As for our Prince Albert, he is most intrigued by the budding Industrial Revolution, which is now sweeping England. There is Charles Babbage's mechanical calculator, a collaborative project with the bewitching Ada Lovelace, daughter of the scandalous Lord Byron. Then there is William Fothergill Cooke's miraculous electrical telegraph, not to mention Marc Isambard Brunel's daring—and dangerous—Thames Tunnel.

What an extraordinary time to be Queen!

The Call The Midwife Holiday Special will air at 8 pm Monday, December 25. It opens with Poplar under a thick blanket of snow, as the midwives face the challenge of the coldest winter for 300 years. The winter

of 1963 saw temperatures plunge to a record low and the whole country brought to a standstill due to the severe weather. Battling snow, ice, power cuts and frozen pipes, the midwives strive to provide the best possible care for their patients. Valerie helps a young couple, newly arrived in




London, who experience a traumatic birth, and Sister Julienne strives to reunite a family torn apart by a tormenting father.

The traditional holiday special will kick off the seventh season of the favorite show. New episodes of **Call the Midwife** will return in the spring of 2018.

A cosmic explosion of comedy, music, dance, and science, **Eric Idle's The Entire Universe** tackles nothing less than the origins of the cosmos in a zany one-hour variety extravaganza premiering Friday, December 22, at 9 pm. In his quest to unlock the secrets of the universe, Idle is ably assisted by renowned British physicist Brian Cox and special guests Warwick Davis, Noel Fielding, Robin Ince and Hannah Waddingham, with an appearance from European Space Agency astronaut and former Space Station crewmember Tim Peake.

Filmed before a live audience, **Eric Idle's The Entire Universe** opens with Master of Ceremonies Idle introducing Professor Cox, who will deliver a lecture on the origins of the cosmos. His valiant attempts to explain the 138-billion-year history of the universe—

1962 Illinois Alumnus starts new internship



obert Endres, a 1962 College of Media graduate, recently made a gift to establish the Robert O. Endres Internship Program at Illinois Public Media. Originally from Streator, Ill., Endres now resides in New York City and works for Dolby Laboratories. But he still recalls fondly his time at the University when he worked at WILL.

"I was hired to be the Saturday engineer for one shift at WILL AM-FM. Not only did it help me financially, but it was a great learning experience. Rob [Beldon, chief engineer] and Clarence [Berbaum, assistant chief engineer] included me on several interesting projects including going out to measure the directional pattern of the AM transmitter at midnight to meet the FCC requirements.

In the meantime I was learning how to direct TV in my Communications classes. At the time WILL-TV studios and transmitter were located under the bleachers at Memorial Stadium. As a student I was able to direct and learn switching in both the studio

and master control rooms. We did a series of news-centered programs on WLLL-TV on Friday evenings. Henry Lippold, the WILL-TV news director, knowing of my interest in cinema, asked if I would like to become a film critic on the series. So I switched from being behind the camera to being in front of it as "Bob Mason." The other critic in town at the *Daily Illini* was a student named Roger Ebert (wonder what ever happened to him!) At the end of the semester Henry got me on WCHU TV (now WICD) as a critic for another semester."

Endres was inspired to start the internship because he credits WILL with his early success. "The knowledge that I gained at WILL both in the engineering position and as a Communications student proved valuable in my first post-college job as an talk show host/DJ at what was then WIZZ AM/FM in Streator."

Endres wanted to pay forward the real-world experiences he gained through his hands-on education. "Obviously, WILL has played a big role in my life. My contributions have been a form of payback... I had been giving to WILL and the College of Media separately but as with other contributions I make to the University, lately I've been looking to help students directly. It occurred to me that if I could combine the two sets of gifts into one that it might not only give a student the opportunity to gain experience in a real time on-air station, but could also in a small way ease some of the financial burden students have today."

Foster also had a yearning for journalism from an early age. "When I was a kid, I wrote a weekly newspaper for our family called *The Weekly Blab*. I'd write about everything that happened that week, and then I would send it out to my parents and brother, as well as extended family. Sometimes they sent in submissions that I would include as well."

For Foster, the appeal of journalism is in the intimacy of the oral story. "I prefer radio and podcasts because you just use the one sense: listening. You feel closer to the person, more connected. Some of my favorite shows are **This American Life** and *Terrible*, *Thanks for Asking*, which actually has a lot of sad stories. But the reason I like it is because people are being completely honest about their experiences, even though they are hard to talk about or listen to."

Further work in audio storytelling is Foster's main priority after graduation. "I've always known that I didn't want to do television, and I really enjoy the real-world experience I am getting from WILL. It's not always glamorous, but I am learning the entire process inside and out, which helps me better understand each part individually. Hopefully after graduation I will continue to work on the production side."

It's the thrill of the story that pulls Foster in. "The great thing about audio reporting is that people get to tell their own stories in their own voices. I want to facilitate that as much as possible. I consume so much of this type of media, shows like *Serial* and *S-Town*, so I have a really good basis for the art of storytelling.

To be a good journalist, you have to care about what people are saying; you have to be a good listener; you have to ask good questions. I'm so happy that I get to watch that in practice with **The 21st**."

ibby Foster of Oak Park, Ill., is the first to receive the Endres internship. She works with **The 21st** team, providing additional assistance to host Niala Boodhoo and producers in show preparation.

While this is not Foster's first experience with recording audio shows, it has been eye-opening. "In my last internship, we did a weekly radio show that was previously recorded. But The 21st is a live, daily show, and it's a bit nerve-wracking! Watching Niala multitask between her interview questions and communicating with producers is pretty awesome."

Foster, a senior in journalism at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, was raised on public radio. "Every morning as we got ready for the day, we had NPR on the radio in the kitchen. In fact, my mom would leave the radio on all day for our dogs, and we would joke that they were the most well-educated pugs you could find!"

Improve your antenna reception with these tips from IPM's engineers!

any people have decided to cut the cable cord and just stream all media online and through antenna. But sometimes reception for WILL-TV on channel 12 can still be a bit fuzzy. Here are some tips straight from the engineers to improve your signal strength and over-the-air reception, old-school style!

• Verify you have the correct antenna

Make sure your antenna is capable of receiving both VHF and UHF. WILL-TV uses VHF, but many antenna only receive UHF. If yours is one of them, upgrade your antenna to receive both frequencies.

Rescan

Rescan your channels, especially if you needed an antenna upgrade.

• Check your outdoor antenna

If you have an outdoor antenna, check it carefully for any storm damage. Then be sure it's facing towards Monticello, where our transmitter is located, for best reception.

• Take stock of your light bulbs

Some LED light bulbs may cause interference with TV and radio signals. When purchasing LED light bulbs, check the box for FCC approved. If you suspect there may be a problem with your LED light bulbs, try turning the light off to see if the TV reception returns.


