AMERICAN PORTRAIT:



Lift Every Voice

American Portrait—a national storytelling project aligned with PBS's 50th anniversary celebration invites everyday people to participate in a national conversation about what it really means to be an American today. Back in June, WILL-TV presented a special local edition of American Portrait, focusing on the lives of those in Central Illinois dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic. You can find and stream American Portrait Central Illinois: Living Through the COVID-19 Pandemic for free with the PBS Video App.

This holiday season, WILL-TV wanted to find out how other locals are being creative during these difficult and dark times. The idea was inspired by a conversation with Dr. William Southerland of Windy City Performing Arts in Chicago. He was about to embark on his inaugural season as the conductor of the organization's two choirs – The Windy City Gay Chorus and the Windy City Treble Quire - but from his home in South Carolina. "I was immediately fascinated by the ins and outs of how he was going to pull off rehearsals and put together the final performance, all online," said Sarah Edwards, director and producer of American Portrait Central Illinois."And as a longtime choir singer, I was hooked on the idea of highlighting what choirs are doing to remain vital during a time when it's so dangerous to sing together."

This idea grew to become American Portrait Central Illinois: Lift Every Voice. Along with the Windy City Performing Arts choirs, the program also documents the work the Danville High School Madrigals and the University of Illinois Black Chorus. Jeff Thomas, who is the



director of the Madrigals, also has his choir operating entirely virtually, but you'll see that Dr. Ollie Watts Davis, longtime conductor of the Black Chorus, is navigating a different set of challenges.

"Dr. Davis was passionate about giving her choir the option to participate in-person, but the logistics haven't been easy," said Edwards. Chorus members contend with singing in oversized "singers masks," maintaining distance, changing locations every half-hour, and the isolating experience of singing along virtually. Davis was inspired early in the pandemic to compose an original piece to help her students cope with the challenges — a song that has become a centerpiece of their rehearsals.

American Portrait Central Illinois: Lift Every Voice will feature the debut of Davis' original composition as well as performances from all three organizations. It's a timely portrait of the staying power of music and the arts in strange and uncertain times. Tune in and let the music inspire and lift you up this holiday season on Monday, December 21 at 7 pm





Olivia Butts is a junior studying journalism at the University of Illinois. A native of Chicago, Butts was not sure what she wanted to study in college until taking a documentary filmmaking class through the College of Media her sophomore year. Butts also found an outlet for her journalistic skills through the Illinois chapter of the National Association of Black Journalists, where she currently serves as vice president.

From a young age, Butts has always enjoyed the art of storytelling through TV shows, movies, documentaries, and podcasting. Before interning at Illinois Public Media, Butts helped transition her friend's radio show Pizza FM—which was broadcast on the local college radio station—into a podcast. "I always liked podcasts, and podcasting is very interesting to me. I like listening to them, and I always thought about creating my own or being part of creating one."

During her time working in Illinois Public Media's Illinois Newsroom, Butts has taken on the role of producer for 217 Today—a daily podcast that includes a snapshot of each weekday's headlines and one deeper dive, all in just ten minutes. Butts works on everything from editing the podcast clips to publishing it on the WILL and Illinois Newsroom websites.

So far, Butts said her internship at Illinois Public Media has strengthened her audio editing skills and allowed her to take more initiative in a professional setting. She's hoping her time working in Illinois Newsroom will prepare for her for a future career in multimedia production. "Especially in journalism it's hard to make a name for yourself. In this internship, I'm looking for experience to make good, professional connections with people and work that I can look back on."

Throughout her time at Illinois, Castellanos has been involved around campus and the community. She used her passion for English to help teach a class of bilingual kindergarteners through the

America Reads program. She also worked for the Office of Volunteer Programs on campus and is currently part of the Undergraduate Law Review.

While at Illinois Public Media as a Gateway for Humanities intern in the WILL Education department, Castellanos has worked on several community engagement projects. These include a Facebook Live event on the role of police in Champaign-Urbana, where she helped coordinate panelists and write interview questions. Castellanos most recently designed voter information graphics that were distributed to campus and community organizations.

Throughout her remaining time working with the WILL Education team, Castellanos hopes to get younger generations more involved in news, especially after seeing the innerworkings of Illinois Public Media's Illinois Newsroom. "The biggest takeaway I've had so far is how on top of things journalists have to be. They always have to come up with new story ideas, be in the know within their communities, and listen to their audience." She hopes these experiences will help her after graduation in finding a job at a non-profit, where she can continue to work on issues that matter to her.


Episode Two: Testing, Testing 1, 2, 3 **Testing**

Lastly, she talks to Mariana Delgado, a senior in Chicago, about how she is helping people in the pandemic.
