

The Black Church: This Is Our Story,

This Is Our Song premieres at 8 pm Tuesdays February 16 and 23. This moving four-hour, twopart series from executive producer, host, and writer Henry Louis Gates, Jr. traces the 400-yearold story of the Black church in America, all the way down to its bedrock role as the site of African American survival and grace, organizing and resilience, thriving and testifying, autonomy and freedom, solidarity and speaking truth to power. The documentary reveals how Black people have worshipped and, through their spiritual journeys, improvised ways to bring their faith traditions from Africa to the New World, while translating them into a form of Christianity that was not only truly their own, but a redemptive force for a nation whose original sin was found in their ancestors' enslavement across the Middle Passage.

Renowned participants in the series include media executive and philanthropist Oprah Winfrey; singer, songwriter, producer, and philanthropist John Legend; singer and actress Jennifer Hudson; Presiding Bishop Michael Curry of The Episcopal Church; gospel legends Yolanda Adams,



Pastor Shirley Caesar, and BeBe Winans; civil rights leaders Rev. Al Sharpton and Rev. William Barber II; scholar Cornel West; and many more. Through their interviews, viewers will be transported by the songs that speak to one's soul, by preaching styles that have moved congregations and a nation, and by beliefs and actions that drew African Americans from the violent margins of society to the front lines of change. Catch the encore presentation of the entire series at 11 am Saturday, February 27.

On Easter Sunday, 1939, contralto Marian Anderson stepped up to a microphone in front of the Lincoln Memorial. Inscribed on the walls of the monument behind her were the words "all men are created equal." Barred from performing in Constitution Hall because of her race, Anderson would sing for the American people in the open air. Hailed as a voice that "comes around once in a hundred years" by maestros in Europe and widely celebrated by both white and Black audiences at home, her fame hadn't been enough to spare her from the indignities and outright violence of racism and segregation. American Experience explores Anderson's rich life story in Voice of Freedom at 8 pm Monday, February 15. The film interweaves this landmark moment in history while exploring fundamental questions about talent, race, fame, democracy, and the American soul.





Mr. SOUL!

In 1968, producer Ellis Haizlip developed a new show aimed at Black audiences, one that used the familiar variety-show format to display and celebrate the breadth of Black culture. For five years, the public television series SOUL! highlighted Black literature, music, and politics, and often paired guests in unexpected juxtapositions that gave them an opportunity to shine in unique ways. Haizlip presided over the show as an unusual, unassuming host who conducted interviews with both an intense interest and laid-back style, attracting notable, eclectic figures to the show, and providing a national platform for previously unheard voices.

The show quickly gained critical praise and public support as one of the first platforms

to expand the image of African Americans on television and shift their representation from inner-city poverty and violence to the vibrancy of the Black Arts Movement. Despite pressure from producers and government administrations, the show never wavered in its celebration of all facets of Black culture, from ballet dancers to blues singers. Presented by Independent Lens, Mr. SOUL! delves into this critical moment in television history, as well as the man who guided it, through participants' recollections and archival footage, highlighting a turning point in representation whose impact continues to resonate to this day. The film airs at 9 pm Monday, February 22.

Goin' Back to T-Town

Goin' Back to T-Town tells the story of Greenwood, an extraordinary Black community in Tulsa, Oklahoma, that prospered during the 1920s and 30s despite rampant and hostile segregation. Torn apart in 1921 by one of the worst raciallymotivated massacres in the nation's history, the neighborhood rose from the ashes, and by 1936 boasted the largest concentration of Black-owned businesses progressive policies of integration and urban renewal of the 1960s. Told through the memories of those who lived through the events, the film is a bittersweet celebration of small-town life and the resilience of a community's spirit. Narrated by Ossie Davis, the film was first broadcast in 1993 and will have an encore broadcast on American Experience at 8 pm Monday, February 8.



We are happy to announce there is a new way to watch WILL-TV. Viewers across east central Illinois are now able to stream our local broadcast signal live at will.illinois.edu and PBS.org, on the PBS Video App, and on Roku streaming

"Viewing habits and technology are changing," said Moss Bresnahan, CEO of Illinois Public Media. "We at Illinois Public Media are very pleased our WILL-TV viewers can now livestream their favorites in dramas and mysteries, science and nature, public affairs and documentaries, and our own award-winning local programming."

"Today marks a significant milestone with the launch of local live streaming on PBS.org, station video portals, and the PBS App on Roku," said Ira Rubenstein, PBS chief digital and marketing officer. "Viewers can now watch their station how, when, and where they want to, regardless of their provider. We now have an option for cord-cutters to watch live station signals free of charge that aligns with over-theair access to broadcast."

In order to enjoy access to our local livestream, viewers must be localized to WILL and physically located within our viewing area. If visiting our website, you can watch the local live stream anytime at video.will.illinois.edu. The PBS Video App is also a great option for streaming WILL-TV, and it is available as a free



download on all the major streaming platforms.

Part of WILL-TV's mission has always been to make sure our programs and content is as easily accessible to all local viewers as possible. However, the technology used to serve this mission is always evolving. "I remember when WILL-TV only had one standard definition channel. Then we made the transition to digital, which brought our viewers High Definition and three channels," said Lillie Duncanson, director of broadcast operations at Illinois Public Media. "This addition of local live streaming is just another platform that we need to utilize in order to get the content our viewers count on to where they are watching."

Duncanson goes on to explain that each of these new technologies requires a ton of hard work and planning. "To make this advancement during a pandemic and while only a handful of station staff are working in the office regularly is a huge accomplishment, and a step we couldn't have reached without the support of the Friends of WILL."

Maestro in our midst

Season 2 of Classical:BTS continues in 2021, uncovering even more lesser-seen - and heard - stories around classical music in central Illinois. So far in this new season, we've explored the personal journeys and music of Illinois Symphony Orchestra principal cellist Nomin Zolzaya and Chicago-based luthier Richard Bruné.

This month, we take a closer look at the musical journey of the new conductor and music director of the celebrated Millikin-Decatur Symphony Orchestra, Dr. William McClain. Throughout episode 3, we explore McClain's extensive music career, including his time as a professional violist and later a conductor who





Keeping children connected during the pandemic

The coronavirus pandemic has separated children from their teachers and created social isolation that can be especially trying on young children. However, WILL Education's Book Mentor Project—which is funded through PNC Bank's Grow Up Great Foundation and serves three-to-fiveyear-old children in all Head Start sites in Champaign County—has been working hard to continue to meet the social, emotional, and literacy needs of local children.



Knowing we could not send pairs of volunteers into Head Start classrooms to read, WILL Education set up a way for mentors to read this year's books virtually and for teachers to distribute these recordings to children and parents via social media apps.

"By making the videos available online, I hope families are able to watch them together, talk about the books, and read along if they want," said Kristin Astorina, a Book Mentor volunteer. "I miss being part of the group, but it was fun to be able to introduce my cat to the class!"

Although the children miss the in-person visits by mentors, their teachers believe the virtual book readings are having their intended effect. "They want to watch the recordings on repeat all day long!" said one teacher from Urbana. Another teacher from Rantoul wrote, "They want to reread the books together. They like to watch the recordings and often ask questions or make comments during the readings."

Despite COVID, some things have remained the same. Book Mentor Project Manager Ana Olguin selected another series of seven highquality bilingual books for the home libraries of all 500 Head Start children and a newsletter of activities for parents and children to do together after reading the book.

"It has been satisfying to be able to continue delivering our program to the Head Start community and still have our mentors involved in the process. In this very uncertain time, we can offer some certainty through giving quality books and suggesting family centered activities that are fun and educative," said Olguin.

And Book Mentor is not just about serving the children, it is about helping the families, too. "This is beneficial to our English Language Learners and parents who have low reading levels. This provides a way for them to be able to interact with their children while promoting literacy development," said one teacher.

Our Book Mentor Jr. program—which serves the three Early Head Start classrooms in the area—also had to adapt how it serves children and families. Volunteers from the Champaign-Urbana Kiwanis Club read to the children virtually and then provide money to purchase the books.

We all look forward to being together again in person in 2021!



Social Justice Learning: Ability Status

Often a lack of understanding someone else's experiences or situation can breed prejudice and discrimination. This can come in the form of social injustices around race, ethnicity, or national origin; sexual orientation, gender, or gender identity/expression; mental or physical ability; and more. WILL Education's Social Justice Learning digital space was create to share educational resources and materials that could help guide children, families, and educators when exploring these critical social justice conversations.

One identity that is often left out of the social justice conversation—and sometimes within the social justice movements themselves—are those with varying degrees of mental and physical abilities. This is known as ableism. Ableism is the discrimination of and social prejudice against people with perceived mental and physical disabilities based on the

belief that typical abilities are superior. This belief can lead to the assumption or feeling that certain people need "fixing." Throughout the spring, our learning space will be focusing on the experiences of those with various mental and physical abilities, and how we can all gain a better understanding of their need for more inclusion.

WILL Education's Social Justice Learning — available at will.illinois.edu/ socialjusticelearning — is divided into sections for early childhood, adolescents, and adults. Each learning level features videos, audio, and text to facilitate a variety of learning styles. As with any social justice conversation, we believe it's critical to begin with our littlest ones and continue that work throughout adulthood so we can keep the conversations, the learning, and the societal shift going to ensure lifelong impact.

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
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
