Chef Marcus Samuelsson

highlights ethnic food in the US

Chef Marcus Samuelsson—co-owner of New York’s critically acclaimed Red Rooster Harlem—embodies America’s extraordinarily rich cultural diversity. Born in Ethiopia, raised in Sweden, and a proud resident of Harlem, he’s inspired by this global background to infuse his culinary experiences with diverse elements of music, history, culture and the arts. Today, he is a celebrated award-winning chef, restaurateur, author, philanthropist, and food activist.

No Passport Required, hosted and executive produced by Samuelsson, will celebrate America’s diverse cultural mosaic as the

famous chef travels to under-explored parts of American cities to showcase the people, places and culinary flavors of immigrant communities.

The show is slated for six one-hour episodes that follow Samuelsson as he explores the best global cuisine hidden in American cities, including the Arab American community in Detroit, the Vietnamese American residents in New Orleans, the Indo-Guyanese community in the New York City borough of Queens, Chicago’s Mexican population, the Ethiopian communities of Washington, DC and the Haitian community in Miami.

“Chasing flavors has been my lifelong passion,” shared Samuelsson. “To now be able to bring viewers on that journey with me to these amazing communities in cities across the U.S. is truly a dream come true. We get to go deep into the markets, pull up to the roadside stands and be welcomed into homes—all the places where people share and celebrate food together.”

The multi-award winning British crime drama **The Tunnel** will return for a third season, **The Tunnel: Vengeance**. The six-part series begins at 9:30 pm Sunday, July 1. The emotional final season of the critically acclaimed bilingual crime thriller reunites Stephen Dillane with Clémence Poésy for the last outing of this beloved and unlikely Anglo-French partnership.

In **The Tunnel: Vengeance**, the investigative pair takes on a toxic and terrifying folie à deux whose mutual defining quality is an existential death wish. When the question posed by the couple—what is a life worth?—is directed straight back at Karl, he is forced to confront an utterly impossible choice that will haunt the audience long after the closing credits.

10 That Changed America, the popular series that explores the nation's built environment, returns this summer with three new episodes and a website that reveal the fascinating and often untold stories behind America's streets, monuments and modern marvels.

In each episode of this new, six-episode series, the Boston-based ladies “flirt” their way into chefs’ kitchens to uncover ethnically unique and delicious foods, then head home to experiment with the recipes themselves, creating cross-cultural culinary mash-ups that viewers can try at home. **The Food Flirts** premieres at 9 pm Friday, July 6. “The Brass Sisters have always been two favorite food people in Boston, and I’m thrilled to bring them to a wider audience,” says producer Bruce Seidel.

Local Friend remembers WILL



She enjoyed keeping in touch with those students and following their careers. She was especially proud of the increasing number of women pursuing careers in agriculture.

Luther's own education and career were remarkable, and yet she didn't go far from her home base on the family's Centennial farm in Champaign County. Her elementary school years were spent at a one-room school in rural Champaign; she then went to Champaign Junior and Senior High Schools and the University of Illinois. While studying at the U of I, Luther got a Civil Service job to help her parents pay for

her education; that job was the beginning of a 49-year career in administration at the University. Luther served in the office of the U of I's Urbana campus Provost, and then as business manager in the Office of the Chancellor. She was known as a quiet and efficient woman of integrity, who served countless administrators, faculty and students.

We are honored that among her many community interests—from the University, where she established an endowed fund that benefits the School of Information Sciences (formerly the Graduate School of Library and Information Sciences), to gifts for the United Way and her church—that Luther included WILL in her estate plan. All WILL listeners and viewers will benefit from her generosity for generations to come.

This past fall, WILL learned that longtime Friend of WILL Mildred Luther had made a generous gift to help sustain the stations in perpetuity. Luther's gift was deposited into the WILL Future Fund, a quasi-endowment used to support the ongoing general operating expenses of the stations. The principal of Luther's gift will be held and will grow over time. Each year, a portion of the investment interest earned will come to the stations and be used to defray general operating expenses. The principal portion will grow over time and will enhance the stations' ability to broadcast and create programs for all in our region.

That seems appropriate, for Luther was devoted to her community. She grew up, was educated, and spent a productive career within the WILL listening and viewing area. Her sister, Kathryn Luther Henderson, recalls the sisters' father listening to WILL on a portable radio kept on their family farm. Luther maintained a lifelong interest in and connection to agriculture. She appreciated WILL-AM's agricultural information and weather service, as well as attended several of WILL Ag's All-Day Ag Outlook meetings in Covington, Indiana. Luther valued many programs on WILL-TV, from **Illinois Gardener** (now, **Mid-American Gardener**) to **Market to Market**, seen on Sunday mornings. For two decades, through the Champaign County Farm Bureau Foundation, she has provided scholarships for two college students studying agriculture.

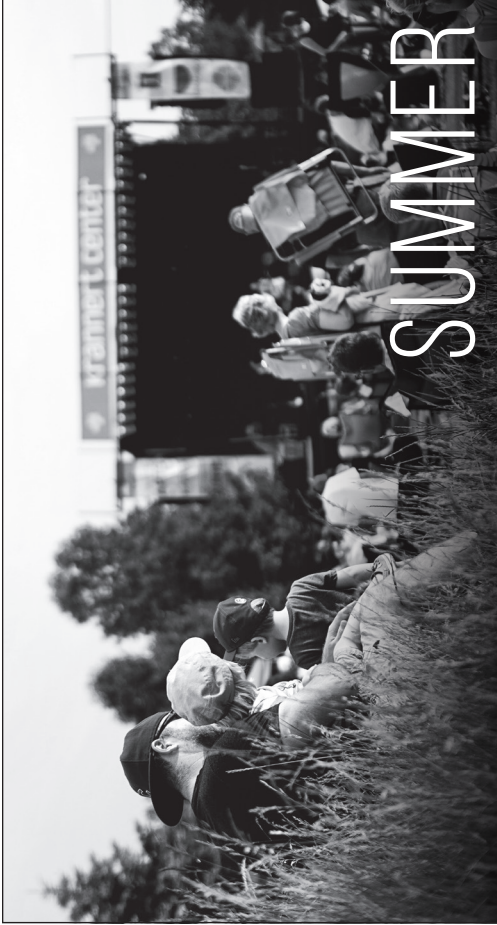
