Production on whales, oceans featured

This month a special one-hour **Prairie Fire** provides a closeup look at the creation and presentation of "CETACEAN (The Whale)," a multimedia performance that does a deep dive on whales and their environmental plight.

Prairie Fire Presents: 'CETACEAN' airs at 7 pm Thursday,

April 18. It includes interviews with artists Deke Weaver and Jennifer Allen, who talk about why they created the show, why it's important, and how it came together. The special also features excerpts from last fall's live performance of "CETACEAN (The Whale)." The performance segment was made possible by a collaboration with students in the fall Cinematography and Sound Design course in the College of Media taught by lecturer Victor Font.

"CETACEAN" is the sixth entry in Weaver's lifelong project called "The Unreliable Bestiary." He and Allen are creating performances for every letter of the alphabet, each representing an endangered animal or habitat. Weaver is a professor of new media in the School of Art and Design. Outside of teaching, he co-creates multidisciplinary performance pieces with his partner, Allen, who is a choreographer, director, and acupuncturist.

"Using our human relationships with these creatures as a lens, the Bestiary project focuses on the severely challenged life systems of the planet," Weaver said. "We do this through contemporary stories, myth, and immersive unusual events. We work with humor and the absurd. Music and silence. People and wonder. Like water and air, the human imagination is elemental to natural systems. It transforms things."

Prairie Fire host and producer Sarah Edwards thought it was important to give audiences a glimpse into Weaver and Allen's artistry, complete with behind-the-scenes footage to introduce the show.



The show included stories from an outdoor leadership school trip that went wrong, echoing broader, dangerous behaviors that have caused chronic environmental problems.

Photo by Nathan Keay "I've been intrigued by Deke Weaver's large-scale performances since I joined Illinois Public Media in 2018," Edwards said. "So when Victor Font expressed interest in giving his cinematography students real-world experience by having them plan and execute a large-scale shoot of 'CETACEAN,' we jumped at the chance to collaborate."

"CETACEAN" featured a large cast, huge-scale video projection, dance, and live sound design, while interweaving tales of the sea and its failing ecosystems. The project was rooted in a year of student workshops about oceans, whales, eco-anxiety, and interconnectivity. Performed last fall at the U. of I. Stock Pavilion, the free show attracted 400-500 people for each performance during its five-night run.

'State of Change' specials to encore

Illinois Public Media will re-broadcast the first three specials of our annual award-winning **State of Change** on Thursdays at 7:30 pm. In each episode, Illinois Public Media environmental reporter Tinisha Spain highlights some of the challenges facing the environment in Illinois.

"Illinois Public Media is committed to empowering as well as informing the public on Illinois' environment," said IPM News and Public Affairs Director Reginald Hardwick, who also is executive producer of the series. "Our stories are not just the 'bad' news. Each special has shown how Illinoisans are making changes to save the environment, whether it is how neighbors have rallied to help bring back bald eagle populations or a brewery that operates solely on solar or Black communities adding greenery to upgrade the quality of life."

Our 2021 special (April 4) includes a divisive debate on fossil fuels in a mostly Black rural community and a look at the increase of invasive plant and animal species. The 2022 special (April 11) focuses on carbon, including concerns over coal ash in one of Illinois' natural areas. The 2023 special (April 25) highlights how the climate crisis is impacting communities of color and climate change is threatening one town that has five EPA superfund sites.

Look for a new **State of Change** special to premiere in November. Production funding is provided by the Backlund Charitable Trust.

Saving coral reefs before it's too late

In **Changing Planet: Coral Special**, Dr. M. Sanjayan visits the Maldives to take an in-depth look at coral reefs and the urgent efforts to help them survive climate change. Featured: alternative treatments for stony coral tissue loss disease, how a remotely operated vehicle helps streamline coral larval restoration efforts, and how sounds can aid young coral populations to settle in ideal locations. Part of a seven-year project that examines the issues facing the planet's most threatened ecosystems, this episode airs at 7 pm Wednesday, April 24.



'Independent Lens' looks at forests, whales



The U.S. is the world's largest producer of wood and paper products, and each year the industry relies almost entirely on foreign guest workers who plant over one billion trees to replenish harvested forests. **A Thousand Pines**, airing at 9 pm Monday, April 1, follows a crew of Mexican guest workers doing the grueling work of planting trees and shows the physical and emotional demands. The film is presented by **Independent Lens** and Latino Public Broadcasting's VOCES.

At 9 pm Tuesday, April 23, **Independent Lens** presents **One With the Whale**. showing how hunting whales is a matter of life or death for the residents of St. Lawrence, Alaska.

Exploring the legacy of Love Canal

Unfolding like a compelling mystery, **American Experience** presents the real story of the residents in a small neighborhood near Niagara Falls that became the center of one of the largest and most impactful public health and environmental crises in American history. The two-hour documentary



Poisoned Ground: The Tragedy at Love Canal begins in 1977, when residents first suspect something is wrong, to the battle for justice for those sickened by the toxic waste beneath their homes. Led mostly by women, the work of citizen scientists informed the policies of the federal Superfund program that today oversees the remediation of more than 1,300 dangerous hazardous waste sites. **Poisoned Ground: The Tragedy at Love Canal** airs at 8 pm Monday, April 22.

On April 8, the moon's shadow is sweeping from Texas to Maine, as the U.S. witnesses its last total solar eclipse until 2044. This extraordinary astronomical event is plunging locations in the path of totality into darkness for more than



four minutes — nearly twice as long as the last American eclipse in 2017. A section of southern Illinois is once again in the path for a total eclipse, with Carbondale said to be close to the eclipse centerline. There are nearly 600,000 people in Ilinois that live inside the path. **NOVA** explores this spectacular cosmic phenomenon in *Great American Eclipse* at 7 pm Wednesday, April 3. A town divided by residents' differing views



Reel Midwest: Carbondale: The Little Blue Dot follows the polarizing story between a city's identity and its past, present, and future. In Carbondale, a center for reproductive health, which includes abortions and genderaffirming care, has not been welcomed by residents.

British computer errors cause false arrests



Following one of the greatest miscarriages of justice in British legal history, Mr Bates vs the Post Office premieres on MASTERPIECE at 8 pm Sunday, April 7. Starring BAFTA-winner Toby Jones, the four-part drama series was created with direct input from the innocent people caught up in the scandal. When money started to seemingly disappear from its local branches, the government-owned Post Office falsely blamed their own managers. For more than a decade, hundreds were accused of theft and fraud, and many were even sent to prison, ruining lives. The issue was actually caused by errors in the Post Office's own computer system, which it denied for years.

"I think public media is important as it provides unbiased news so everyone can educate themselves while forming their own opinions on our world and what's occurring in it." Contreras said. "It also provides entertainment for all ages and backgrounds, which is pretty neat to me."

What does he do in his spare time? "I'm a huge movie buff, and one of my goals in life is to sell a screenplay one day and subsequently become a director!"

New political reporter has you covered

Illinois Public Media is committed to local news coverage, and an election year provides additional challenges. Reporter and documentary producer David Pierce joined IPM News in February to ensure we provide comprehensive coverage of candidates, local issues, race results, and more.

Pierce will create content for TV, radio, and digital platforms, covering the 2024 primaries and general election for the 2nd, 13th, and 15th districts. He also will produce a feature series each month. In **Voice of the Voter**, Pierce will speak with young people about the importance of this election, issues they believe are impacting them, and concerns surrounding democracy.

"David also will develop and produce a TV special about the first Black students at UIUC," said Reginald Hardwick, IPM news and public affairs director. "He will collaborate with the documentary filmmakers who helped us create **State of Change**. He's extremely connected here and enthusiastic about telling stories."

"My goal is to provide accurate and people-focused stories to keep our audience informed," Pierce said. "Having a local reporter is critical. As part of this community, I know what issues are important, and I will ask candidates the right questions on behalf of our residents. I'm most excited about adding my expertise in TV reporting for Illinois Public Media, so our audience can receive their news where they want it."

Pierce earned his bachelor's degree at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign in 2017, and returned to Champaign-Urbana to be a producer and reporter at Fox Illinois. Early in his career he produced his own show, "The Intellekt," for YouTube. It also aired on online news outlet Chicago Access Network Television (CAN TV). He covered popular culture events — such as the Chicago Auto Show and the grand opening of the world's largest Starbucks — and showed their impact on Chicago residents.

Pierce enjoys dancing and spending time with his family.
