Season 6: More heartwarming, humorous adventures of a young country vet



All Creatures Great and Small returns to **MASTERPIECE** this month with season 6, taking us back to the beautiful Yorkshire Dales. It's May 1945 and the Skeldale gang is stepping into a new chapter shaped by change and hopes for a more peaceful future.

The series is the second adaptation of James Herriot's celebrated books featuring adventures of a veterinarian set in the fictional village of Darrowby.

The first episode premieres at 8 pm Sunday, Jan. 11, or join us in Springfield on Jan. 8, for an advance screening (see below). Season 5 begins with Skeldale House in disarray. As victory in Europe is declared, there is the promise of peace at last, but James is wishing for a greater sense of peace at the clinic as he juggles vet work with a busy family life. Helen's enjoying time with young Jimmy and Rosie but has big changes afoot at Heston Grange to contend with. Tristan returns from several years at war and is trying to readjust to life back home. Everyone tries to reconnect with each other and find their renewed purpose, as the world around them starts to breathe again and look to a brighter future.



You also can watch the final episode of season 5, **All God's Creatures**, at 7 pm Sunday, Jan. 4, followed by a rebroadcast of **All Creatures Great and Small: Cheers to the Years!** at 8:30 pm. In the season 5 finale, Skeldale House prepares for Christmas and Jimmy's first birthday

— without the usual festive treats available. **Cheers to the Years!** shares the most memorable moments from the first five seasons, going behind the scenes with the cast and creators to discuss the evolution of the series — from the books to their first impressions of each other to the series pilot. It explores each of the characters — human and animal.

All seven episodes of season 6 will be available to stream with WILL Passport on Jan. 11.

MASTERPIECE recently announced that **All Creatures Great and Small** will return with seasons 7 and 8, each comprises six episodes plus Christmas specials.

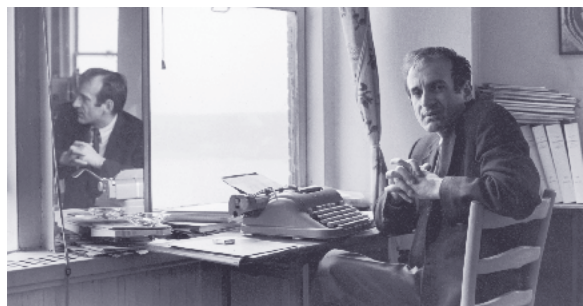

REMEMBERING THE HOLOCAUST

On Jan. 27, we feature several specials in observance of International Holocaust Remembrance Day. The day focuses on the victims of the Holocaust, as do our films.

Eighty years after his liberation from Buchenwald, we seek to understand the man behind Elie Wiesel's searing and widely read memoir, "Night." Told largely through his own words and eloquent voice, **American Masters: Elie Wiesel: Soul on Fire** (8 pm)

seeks to penetrate to the heart of the known and unknown Elie Wiesel (1928-2016) — his passions, his conflicts, and his legacy as one of the most public survivors of the trauma of the Holocaust. With unique access to personal archives, original interviews, and employing hand-painted animation, the film illuminates Wiesel's biography as a survivor, writer, teacher, public figure, and Nobel Peace Prize winner. This program is available with WILL Passport on Jan. 27.



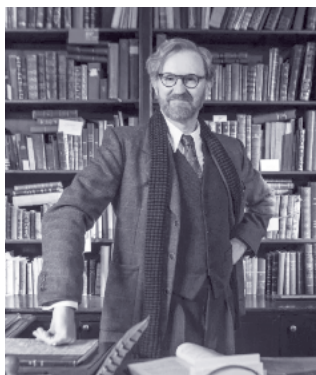

Simon Schama: The Holocaust, 80 years on (9:30 pm) is a deeply personal film. In it, Simon Schama, a renowned historian and lifelong documenter of Jewish history, examines the Holocaust as a worldwide crime and its lasting impact today, 80 years after the liberation of Auschwitz. This program is available with WILL Passport on Jan. 27.

The first episode of **Stories of Survival** (10:30 pm) is set in the summer of 1944, at the height of the deportation of Hungarian Jews. In the episode, Magda Brown and George Brent have arrived as teenagers to the notorious Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp. Through their eyes, the episode **Final Transports** portrays the human aspects of survival, resistance, chance, and luck in the face of Nazi tyranny. 'Miss Scarlet' returns in season 6

London's New Year's Day Parade is a cherished tradition bringing pomp, circumstance, and good old-fashioned fun to the U.K. capital. Broadcast live, **The London Parade 2026** — starting at 7 am CST on Thursday, Jan. 1 — marks the 40th year of the celebrated event that is viewed by people around the globe as participants follow the parade route through the ancient city of Westminster. It features cultural and community groups as well

as leading professional entertainers and the mayors of London. Plus, more than 20 U.S. marching bands and a thousand cheerleaders will help fill the streets. In addition, more than 8,000 performers from all over the world bring a kaleidoscopic mix of culture and community. Join the Lord Mayor of Westminster, the Right Worshipful Paul Dimoldenberg, and host and parade founder Bob Bone for the best views along the two-mile route.

And you can ring in the New Year with one of the finest orchestras in the world as the Vienna Philharmonic presents its annual concert from Vienna's Musikverein. Conducted for the first time by Yannick Nézet-Séguin, the special is hosted by Hugh Bonneville. 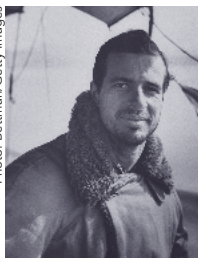

The (real story of the) atomic bombings

A new documentary presented by **American Experience** explores how the U.S. government manipulated the narrative about the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki that ended World War II. Eighty years after the devastating atomic bombings that ushered in the nuclear age, **Bombshell** explores how — through propaganda, censorship, and the co-opting of the press — the government presented a benevolent picture of atomic power, minimizing the horrific human toll of the bombings. The documentary sheds light on the efforts of courageous journalists, including John Hersey and Leslie Satoru Nakashima, to inform the world about the human costs of nuclear weapons, despite government censorship. Their long-overlooked but crucial perspective underscores the essential role of journalists in telling the story of the atomic bomb. **Bombshell** airs on **American Experience** at 8 pm Tuesday, Jan. 6.

Meet three of Kenya's super tuskers



Follow the lives of three African elephant bulls in **Nature: Tusker: Brotherhood of Elephants**. Craig, Pascal, and Esau are tuskers each at a different stage of adult life. Set against the dramatic backdrop of Mount Kilimanjaro and the open plains of Amboseli, the documentary offers a rare glimpse into the complex lives of these giants — from their annual cycle of musth and the drive for dominance to the subtle social bonds that form between males. Airing at 7 pm Wednesday, Jan. 14, their stories reflect a lifetime of survival and strength that are shaped by decades of navigating drought, conflict, and human-wrought change.

Illinois Soul marks two years of culture, community, and connection

MAYSA TO HEADLINE ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION



Illinois Soul is turning 2, and the celebration is set to be nothing short of unforgettable. In just two years, the station has become a cultural heartbeat for central Illinois — elevating Black music, amplifying local voices, and creating spaces where community, creativity, and conversation collide. This February, the anniversary festivities reach their peak with a signature event that embodies everything Illinois Soul stands for: a live performance by the incomparable Maysa, taking place at Krannert Center's Tryon Festival Theatre at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 7.

A Grammy-nominated vocalist known for her velvety tone, emotional depth, and decades of impact across soul, jazz, and R&B, Maysa is the perfect artist to help mark this milestone. Her music — warm, honest, and richly textured — reflects the same

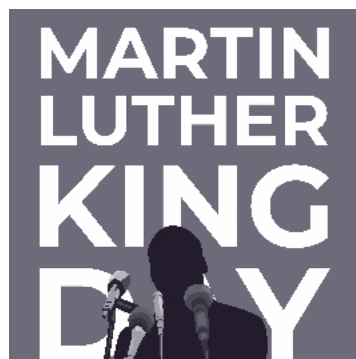

Book Mentor Project celebrates its 21st year



Since 2004, Illinois Public Media's Book Mentor Project has been connecting pre-kindergarten students with books, learning activities, and caring volunteers from across east central Illinois. The initiative, funded by a grant from PNC's Grow Up Great Foundation, is now celebrating its 21st year of making reading an exciting, shared experience for children, educators, and families.

Each fall, the project kicks off by training a new group of volunteer book mentors — drawn from local businesses, service groups, and University of Illinois staff. Once a month, these volunteers visit the same Head Start classroom to read a featured book and lead a fun, hands-on activity tied to literacy, math, science, or the arts.

The visits are more than just storytime — they're designed to build trust, spark curiosity, and create lasting connections between students and books. Parents receive reading plans and activity suggestions to extend the learning beyond the classroom, ensuring the learning continues long after the visit ends.

"We would like to thank all the volunteers and the PNC Grow Up Great Foundation for the continuing support to make this program possible," said John Steinbacher, director of development. "Having worked closely with this program, I can say with authority that it offers measurable academic improvements for the children who participate."



IPM staff led by Heather Ennis-Rosenblat, and University of Illinois student workers Amelia Bellizzi and Michelle Garduno provide administrative support and translation services to help keep the project running smoothly for nearly 400 children across 14 Head Start classrooms and several partner locations across the region.
