The repercussions from recent severe federal funding cuts to public media is only beginning to be felt across the country as stations face difficult decisions. The full impact won't be known for some time. Unfortunately, we're already seeing serious consequences — including the recent announcement that WEIU-TV in Charleston will drop its affiliation with PBS. This is a painful loss as WEIU has long provided additional options of PBS programming for our region. It also means less variety in PBS KIDS content for local families.

Here at Illinois Public Media, we are not facing changes as drastic — but we are not immune. Like many public media organizations, we must take difficult but necessary steps to balance our current costs with long-term sustainability. This means making adjustments to our programming schedule in ways that reduce expenses while aiming to minimize disruption to your listening and viewing experiences.

Behind the scenes, we've also had to make hard staffing decisions. Two full-time positions have been eliminated, and three other open positions will not be filled. In addition, we've significantly reduced our part-time roles, and more changes may be necessary. These are not decisions we make lightly. Every choice is guided by our mission and commitment to serving you and our broader community of listeners, viewers, and supporters.

Thanks to the incredible generosity of the Friends of WILL, we're in a position to weather this storm. But we're not standing still and hoping for the best. We're partnering with the University of Illinois Employee Learning and Organizational Effectiveness team to launch a new strategic planning process — one that will include your input and will focus on building a stronger, more sustainable future for Illinois Public Media.

We will continue to keep you informed as this work unfolds. Our dedication to serving the central Illinois community remains unchanged. Illinois Public Media is — and always will be — for everyone.

Illinois Classical: a new name for central Illinois' source for classical music

A NAME THAT REFLECTS A RICH TRADITION, BROAD MISSION

WILL-FM 90.9 Classical, a beloved radio station for classical music fans across downstate Illinois, is proud to announce its new name as Illinois Classical. This rebranding reflects the station's enduring commitment to providing world-class classical music programming while aligning more closely with other brands that are part of Illinois Public Media.

For more than 50 years, the station has served as a cultural touchstone for communities throughout central Illinois, offering listeners a thoughtful mix of classical music, expert curation, other musical genres, and educational enrichment. Illinois Classical is the region's only overthe-air classical music station. The new name underscores this vital role and positions the station as the definitive source for classical music in the region.

"This isn't just a name change — it's a better reflection of who we are and who we serve," said station manager Max Ramirez. "Illinois Classical honors our deep roots as part of the University of Illinois while embracing a future that seeks to broaden our appeal to more of our Illinois community members."

The new name Illinois Classical also aligns with other core services under the Illinois Public Media umbrella, including IPM News, Illinois Soul, and the broader mission of the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign's "Illinois" brand to represent and serve the state with pride and purpose.

The rebrand includes a new mark created by IPM art director Kurt Bielema.

"Early on, I knew I wanted to use a harp as the Illinois Classical mark," Bielema said. "The first draft of the mark was well received, but not totally right. I found the needed inspiration on the Illinois campus — specifically Foellinger Auditorium. The new Illinois Classical harp is my interpretation of the patinated copper harps on the cornice of the iconic building."

Listeners can continue to enjoy the same high-quality programming — from timeless symphonies and emerging composers to live performances and locally produced shows, like **Classic**Mornings, Prairie Performances, and the Atomic Age Cocktail Party — all under a name that proudly signals its Illinois legacy and mission to reach all community members.

The transition to the Illinois Classical name began its rollout across radio broadcasts, digital platforms, social media, and community events on Sept. 30. For more information, visit illinoisclassical.org or scan the QR Code.

Deaf actress Marlee Matlin blazes a trail

American Masters presents an intimate documentary that explores the life and career of Oscar-winning deaf actress Marlee Matlin. Born into a hearing family, like roughly 95% of deaf people, she faced episodes of isolation and abuse. She found joy in performing at a local deaf theater. In 1987, Matlin became the first deaf actor to win an Academy Award and was thrust into the spotlight at 21 years old. Reflecting on her life in her primary language of

American Sign Language, the film explores the complexities of what it means to be a trailblazer. In her directorial debut, Shoshannah Stern — a deaf actress herself — presents a personal, honest, and loving conversation that weaves together Matlin's first-person account with interviews with those who know her best. American Masters: Marlee Matlin: Not Alone Anymore premieres at 8 pm Thursday, Oct. 14.

Phil Sharp and his global innovations

A farm boy from rural Kentucky, Phil Sharp is an unlikely hero — from humble beginnings to a Nobel prize-winning discovery that sparks the biotechnology industry, catalyzing drug discovery that helped 7 billion people in 2024 alone. Cracking the Code, narrated by Mark Ruffalo, is an inspiring story of vision, perseverance, and the power of science to change the world. Phil Sharp's 1977 groundbreaking discovery of RNA splicing rewrote the rules of molecular biology and ignited a life-saving scientific revolution, laying the foundation for an industry that has become a cornerstone of global innovation and economic growth. In its season 27 premiere, Independent Lens presents Cracking the Code: Phil Sharp and the Biotech Revolution at 9 pm Monday, Oct. 6.

A 100-year battle for women's rights

Most Americans believe the U.S. Constitution protects gender equality. It does not. Ratified is a film about the 100-year-fight for an Equal Rights Amendment. When the ERA was first put forward in 1924, women were still considered the legal property of their husbands. Much has changed since then, but despite tremendous gains, American women still experience second-class citizenship in pay, health care, legal protection, and, perhaps most importantly, in the public imagination. Presented by Independent Lens at 9 pm Monday,



Oct. 20, Ratified brings the Equal Rights Amendment to life through Virginia's pivotal ratification battle. Led by Black women and with the support of a multiracial, multigenerational coalition, this documentary traces the legal, political, and deeply personal fight to enshrine gender equality in the U.S. Constitution nearly a century after the ERA was first proposed.

A Chicago sculptor, fossil hunting, and more

Several short documentaries are planned for this month's Prairie Fire, airing at 7:30 pm Thursday, Oct. 16. You can catch up on previous segments with WILL Passport or at will.illinois. edu/prairiefire or scan the QR Code below.

This month, the team explores Sola Gratia Farm, created to make healthy food accessible for all by nurturing productive land and cultivating diverse, inclusive communities. The episode follows the harvest from field to table at Jubilee Café — a freshly cooked, made-from-scratch restaurant experience for community members who struggle with food insecurity.

The team also is working on a segment about fossil hunting in the Shawnee National Forest with geologists from the University of Illinois Urbana-

Champaign. The adventure will reveal some history about the incredible rock formations in the area.

In addition, a profile of sculptor Josh Garber, who has been active in Chicago for over 35 years, is underway. Creating organic sculptures using welded steel, aluminum, and brass, Garber emphasizes tactile and playful elements in his work through the use of industrial materials like screws and hex nuts.





Grace Bumbry's rise to global opera fame

The Magic of Grace Bumbry tells the story of the African American Missouri native who became one of the world's most renowned opera singers. She first achieved international renown as the first African American to be cast in a major role at the prestigious Bayreuth Festival in Germany in 1961, where she received 40 ecstatic curtain calls. Beginning her career as a mezzo-soprano, Bumbry later expanded her repertoire to include dramatic soprano roles. Throughout her distinguished career, she performed in nearly every major opera house in the world. And the



story of her performance in the 1966 production of "Carmen," directed by legendary German conductor Herbert von Karajan, was one of her most magical moments. The Magic of Grace Bumbry airs on Great Performances at 8 pm Friday, Oct. 3.

Explore the past and future of the walrus

In its season 44 premiere, Nature explores the life of the walrus. For Kirk Johnson, scientist and Sant Director of the Smithsonian National Museum of Natural History, the walrus has been a creature close to his heart for 30 years. Johnson treks across the Arctic to uncover the hidden lives of these lumbering giants, their cultural significance to the native peoples of the North, and the threats they face as climate change shrinks the sea ice. Johnson will explore the walrus's evolutionary past and reveal the creature's ability to adapt, survive, and thrive through the ages. With global climate change, perhaps this colossal creature will be forced to adapt once more. Nature: Walrus: Life on Thin Ice airs at 7 pm Wednesday, Oct. 22.



Schedule updates for WILL-AM 580

Beginning Oct. 1, listeners and viewers will notice some changes in the programming schedule on our radio stations and on WILL 12.3 (Create/World). These come at a time of significant financial challenges due to Illinois Public Media's loss of \$1.5 million a year in federal funding from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting.

The conversations that led to these changes have not been easy. Like many public media organizations across the country, we have come to the realization that we must cut some of our core programming in order to survive the considerable reduction in our funding. At the same time, we are deeply grateful that our national distributors — PBS, NPR, PRX, and APM — are working alongside local stations like ours to provide temporary relief. Their partnership allows us to preserve much of our existing schedule for now, while we continue to grow local support.

This moment has underscored just how much we depend on our donors, and your support is more vital now than ever. Using audience data and trends, we've carefully adjusted our lineup to maintain a strong balance of local, national, and international news coverage, while also

bringing programs that bring joy, curiosity, and connection.

On TV, we are dropping World from 12.3, so the station will now be Create 24 hours a day.

On radio, locally produced programs remain one of our core values. It is at the heart of our mission to serve central Illinois. That is why we are adding more

airings of our locally produced shows like Prairie Performances, Dialogue and Weather **Realness**. These programs are the most direct way we reflect the voices, issues, and culture of our community, and we are proud to give them an even stronger presence.

There also are a few new shows that will bring fresh voices and perspectives to our airwaves, offering a balance to the news cycle. IPM is not going anywhere. The funding cuts may make us look a bit different — but these changes reflect our commitment to our listeners to inform, inspire, and entertain.



Facing fierce opposition and legal challenges from private property owners, leaders fought to reclaim these corridors for the public, creating a national network of scenic, car-free paths, including the Illinois Prairie Path in suburban Chicago. Veteran journalist Jim Meadows retires after 25 years at WILL

After 25 years of covering elections, weather, and local news across central Illinois, veteran journalist Jim Meadows signed off from WILL-AM and WILL-FM for the last time this past August. Over his long career, Meadows provided in-depth, thoughtful reporting to the people of Illinois, both at Illinois Public Media and prior to that at WCBU in Peoria.

Meadows' work spanned a wide range of subjects. He helped central Illinois residents make sense of the local humanitarian response following



the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks. He examined everything from agriculture to urban squirrel populations, contributing to the long-running talk show Focus (formerly Focus 580). In recent years, he produced in-depth features on Illinois agriculture for Harvest Public Media.

Throughout his tenure, Meadows served as host for NPR programs including Morning Edition, All Things Considered, and Weekend Edition. He also played a key role in celebrating WILL-AM's 100th anniversary in 2022, producing a a series of feature stories and interviews highlighting the station's rich history. (See will.illinois.edu/will100/articles.) His daily Illinois History Minutes became a listener favorite, offering engaging snapshots of the state's past. (See will.illinois.edu/illinoishistory.)

"In the great tradition of old-school journalism, Jim held the powerful accountable, asked the hard questions, and told the stories that mattered most to central Illinois," said Moss Bresnahan, executive director of Illinois Public Media. "We celebrate not just his award-winning career, but the integrity, curiosity, and passion he brought to every story. We will miss his strong sense of curiosity, and his professional and caring on-air presence."

Reflecting on his career, Meadows called his time in public media the fulfillment of a lifelong dream: "When I was a college kid, I wanted to work in public radio, and I got my wish! What's more, I got to spend a quarter-century at a station I had first listened to in high school — one that was big enough to give me opportunities to do all kinds of work, with a lot of great co-workers to help me do it.
