Illinois Radio Reader celebrates 40 years

In September, Illinois Radio Reader will celebrate its 40th anniversary. Created in 1978 through the combined efforts of a CU Junior League Task Force and WILL, the former Illinois Radio Reading Service provided printed material in a audio format for use by those with limited reading capabilities.

Since its inception, IRR has serviced over 2000 listeners with the support of 500 volunteers. The Illinois State Library has provided the services funding for the last 38 years. Other funding provided by the Community Foundation of East Central Illinois, generous donors, and IPM.

The history of Illinois Radio Reader

IRR goes on the air for 3 hours a day, thanks to the generous support of the CU Junior League, WILL, and various foundations.

In just 2 months, 526 volunteer hours are logged, and the program is listed as a service of the U of I's Division of Broadcasting.

IRR moves from Armory Street to Campbell Hall. This conversion involves upgrading equipment and providing whisper booths to ensure better quality programming.

Through the efforts of coordinator Kathie Spegal, the program continues to grow. Volunteers read over 2000 hours a year, saving \$50,000 in production costs.

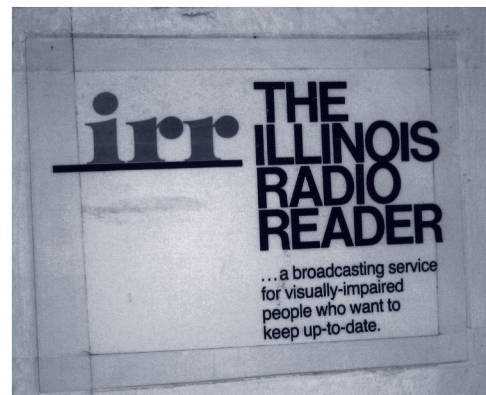

New senior producer/director returns to her roots

For central Illinois native Sarah Edwards, the role of senior producer and director at IPM was the chance to come full circle in her career. “I started my TV production career here at WILL, in fact! I spent a summer on the set of the docudrama **I’d Be Delighted**, where I learned about lighting, camerawork, and the excitement and discipline of working on a set.”

It’s this basis that has fueled Edwards through a high-paced film career across the country. “After college, I spent a summer in Washington, DC, as an intern for *Dateline NBC*, where I decided TV journalism sounded exciting. Then I went to Columbia University’s Graduate School of Journalism for my master’s degree.”

Post-master’s, Edwards paid her dues on a variety of television sets, including *Seventh Heaven* and *ER*. She then returned to journalism in Atlanta, working for CNN. “What interested me most was CNN’s push to create ‘one-man bands’: people who could shoot, report, edit, and write with just a high-quality video camera and a laptop.” With her colleague Marina Kolbe, Edwards traveled coast to coast for 5 years shooting feature packages.

“My experience with CNN led to my desire to create my own projects. I decided to pursue a freelance career in LA. Over the past 14 years, I’ve directed, produced, edited, and shot all kinds of videos and documentaries with a concentration in music.” This experience allowed Edwards to rub shoulders with the industry’s most famous, including Katy Perry, Blink 182, and Korn.

Family life now takes precedence over the fast track of the west coast. “I’m very excited about getting outdoors with my family in our new neigh-



borhood. We’re all getting bikes and I’m especially looking forward to going camping this fall at Shades with my longtime friends.”

The return to public media feels like perfect timing for Edwards. “I decided awhile ago to make my career in soulful, high-quality storytelling. That’s what attracted me to documentary work. There’s a real sense of excitement here about how we can reinvigorate WILL’s programming with that same commitment to quality even as we integrate elements like social media, collaborate with our colleagues in radio, and reach out to new audiences. It’s a wonderful time to be here.”

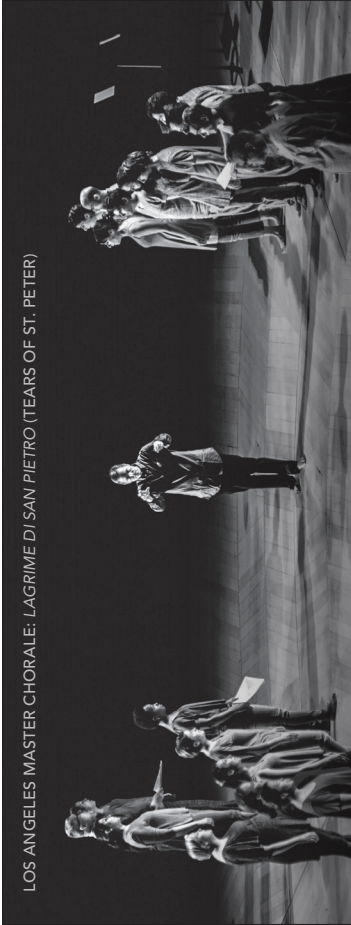
